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## One treat at a time.

Waggies is unique because it blends volunteers and paid workers who together produce over 3,000 hand cut, healthy dog treats per baking day. Sales and sponsorships help keep Waggies in the black and thriving. Waggies history includes being a beneficiary of funds from DFRC.

Ten years ago, Maggie and Elizabeth were turning twenty-one and their mothers, Leigh Corrigan and Mary Ann Nolan, were wondering about what the next step would be for the girls. It was obvious that opportunities for meaningful employment for young adults with intellectual disabilities were almost non-existent and so the seed of entrepreneurship was planted. They wanted a consumable product but did not wish to venture into people food. Dog owners are known to be indulgent toward their four legged friends so, why not dog treats? They officially became Waggies by Maggie & Friends, purchased a small mixer, trays, bags and labels and went in search of a place to bake...and a customer or two. Aldersgate United Methodist Church in north Wilmington offered its beautiful commercial kitchen. Eileen Janssen of Janssen's Market gave Waggies a premier location in the store and has continued to be a mentor and friend. Apropo Gift Shop, now known as Whimsy, also offered to carry Waggies. Maggie, Elizabeth and their friend Laura were ready to work. Baking began. Along the way it became clear that this little business needed help in making ends meet and DFRC answered the prayer. A "cost of doing business"

grant helped finance expenses related to barcode registration, insurance and equipment. Years later, DFRC funding helped with packaging expenses. Waggies grew, hired more bakers and volunteers gave their time and talents. Life was good.

Fast forward to today. The Elks Club of north Wilmington has graciously donated its kitchen for baking four days a week. Waggies has a permanent home and now employs a dozen bakers. news is, there are few, if any, full-time opportunities for the bakers. The good news is, the bakers love working at Waggies and want to stay. Volunteers are quoted as saying, "My day at Waggies is the best day of my week." "When I leave Waggies, I'm smiling."



The bakers have part-time jobs with a paycheck and each has become skilled at the many levels of the baking process. Some work three days a week, others two or one. Volunteers help to make everyday inclusive, vibrant and productive. The team is proud of recently winning M&T bank's "What's Important in Business" contest.

Initially, the thought was to hire bakers to give them experience to move on to full-time employment. The bad Waggies is grateful to DFRC and other friends who have supported its mission of employment. Waggies by Maggie & Friends continues to be a work in progress and looks forward to spreading the message that adults with intellectual disabilities are an untapped pool of talent.

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## What Goes Around, Comes Around...

A recent leadership chat with students at Newark Charter School (NCS) led our Executive Director, Dr. Tony Glenn, to a resounding query echoing through the hallway, "Mr. Glenn, is that really you?" He turned to discover Saint Mark's alumna, Marie Kelly Cowgill. Marie is a Reading Specialist at NCS and in the twenty-two years since her graduation from high school, she suddenly, very keenly realized how much she missed her former teacher whose example had so greatly influenced her life.

As Marie reminisced about her four vears at Saint Mark's High School (SMHS), the most meaningful theme of her memories focused on community, the genuine care, compassion and love of community. She especially remembers the commitment to prayer, as the community loved and supported each other. A very large part of the Saint Mark's community revolved around the Blue-Gold Committee. Marie was a member of the Blue-Gold Committee, and she very vividly remembers the buddies who partnered with them. Being part of the Blue-Gold Committee at SMHS was cool because no one was forcing anyone to do anything, but instead, Marie and her classmates loved the responsibility of leading, deciding and following through, knowing they were fully supported.

Tony Glenn, former teacher and now Executive Director of DFRC, played in the 1973 DFRC Blue-Gold All\*Star Football Game. Even after playing and coaching football at the University of Delaware, he remained committed to the truth of abilities and the love he learned from the buddies who so deeply touched his life after being involved in DFRC. He took that passion to SMHS as a teacher,

where he initiated the first high school very Blue-Gold Committee in the state of Delaware. Marie and her fellow committee members were empowered to lead and plan activities with buddies their throughout the school year. Everything they did was ground-breaking and set an example for other schools to eventually follow.

As a middle school student at Holy Angels School, Marie remembers a visit from the Saint Mark's Blue-Gold Committee, giving them information about the committee and describing the inspiration their buddies had given them about abilities and what's really important in life. Those were the early days of DFRC's Education Awareness Program and later, as a senior in high school, Marie had the opportunity to be among the students to return to Holy Angels and share the sensitivity they learned from the relationships they established with all the buddies.

Dan is a 47 year-old man who lives in Colorado. He has a job he loves and takes the bus to work every day. When he was younger, Dan lived in Delaware and he was Marie's buddy at SMHS. He attended Dickinson High School, where he helped with the football team and proudly wore his letter jacket. Marie remembers taking Dan to the Charcoal Pit, the movies and bowling.

She went to Dan's Special Olympics' events and he attended her lacrosse games. Marie and Dan very quickly became comfortable with each other and their relationship soon developed into a meaningful friendship. Marie realized that she and Dan are far more alike than they are different. Twenty-two years later, Marie and Dan still talk on the phone regularly. He asks Marie about what's happening in her life, wants to know about her husband and children, and Marie and Dan like to tease each other about their different taste in music. Dan's mother thanks Marie for staying in touch with her son. Marie humbly accepts that gratitude, knowing that she has received one-thousand times more than she has given. Dan knows how much Marie loves and respects him, but he likely has no idea how much his life has enriched hers.

Grateful for all the opportunities she had at SMHS, Marie went to college, uncertain of her life career until the "Introduction to Exceptional Children" class she took. One day, she lost herself, reading beyond an assignment about people who "don't quite fit the typical mold," embracing unique ways to teach them and keep them included. It was then that the pieces from her Blue-Gold experiences began to fit perfectly into the knowledge she was finding about enhancing and adapting teaching methods for children with learning differences. The lights were shining brilliantly and her path to teaching special education became clear. In her teaching career, Marie has taught regular and special education at several grade levels, emphasizing how deeply Dr. Glenn, Dan, and her Blue-Gold experiences at SMHS continue to inspire her.

around! Marie married former DFRC Blue-Gold Ambassador Brian Cowgill from Middletown High School. Because of the valuable experiences Marie and Brian have had, their two children are following along in their footsteps. Ten-year-old Catherine is a unified partner, enjoying each opportunity to spend time with the Special Olympians she has come to know. At age 7, Adam is joining his sister in discovering an awareness to understand how, by giving of ourselves, we can help others and make a difference in the world.

Marie and her family are living proof of unconditional love, honest innocence, spirituality, remaining true to yourself, and not allowing yourself to get caught up in worldly things, but to instead, give from the heart and care genuinely. It is a huge responsibility to be partnered with a buddy, but one whose value cannot be measured. Because of the positive influence our buddies offer, the world is better and brighter for all of us. What we give is rewarded many times over by the life-lessons we learn from our buddies. When we give of ourselves in a commitment to service, we can change the world, one life at a time. What goes around, comes around, again and again and again!
