CELEBRATING MICHAEL

arlier this year our family and friends celebrated my brother Michael's 50th birthday. On top of that, this year's DFRC Blue-Gold All- Star Football Game will mark the 40th anniversary since Michael was chosen as the All- Star Buddy back in 1970. An anniversary year such as this leads one to reflect and examine life and how far we have come.

The 1960s were a time of uncertainty in terms of how society was going to address the needs of individuals with intellectual disabilities. My parents, Margaret and Joseph McNesby, made a brave choice back in a time when there was a great deal of confusion on what to do and pressure to institutionalize or

"give up" children like Michael who had Down Syndrome or any other intellectual disability. We were blessed with parents who made the correct decision. What had seemed like such a challenge fifty years ago has truly proved to be a blessing in the years since.

In our home with five siblings, Michael was the baby of the family and our world revolved around him. Growing up in a small row house in Cleland Heights, our street was filled with kids who were always accepting of Michael as they themselves tried to figure out what was different, yet so special about him.

Our relatives, including numerous aunts, uncles, and cousins,



Many of these people were part of the group of 200 who attended Michael's 50th Birthday on February 20. We were truly blessed by their presence and appreciative of their generosity in helping us raise over \$4,500 for DFRC in lieu of birthday presents.

There is no doubt that Michael has had much help and love along the way. And how could he go wrong? He attended the Meadowood School as a child and his first teachers were Barbara and Winnie Spence. Barb and Winnie were much more than teachers - they often took Michael home with them on summer weekends to swim in their pool. Barb and Winnie have been lifelong friends of the family and we love them dearly.

In 1970, when Michael was the All– Star Buddy, I was also honored to play on the Gold team with this year's Gold Head Coach, Bill Collick. Unfortunately, there was no Hand-in-Hand program back then to give the high school

participants the opportunity to truly appreciate the real reason they were playing in one of Delaware's richest and longest standing traditions. This tradition continues to exist because of the hard work of devoted and caring volunteers throughout the state, the financial support of DFRC's valued donors, and the leadership provided by the Executive Director, and the small, but dedicated, staff in the DFRC office.

Michael has truly benefited from the game and DFRC's beneficiaries. Among many other organizations, DFRC supports Special Olympics Delaware where Michael has been a member of the Thunderbears bowling and bocce teams.



neighbors who would also serve as mentors and role models to me. The one thing that all of them would do which provided a tremendous spark for me, was that they never hesitated to bring me along to their Saturday morning football games in Georgetown.

It was during the 1969-70 football season that the late Frank Coveleski (head coach at Cape Henlopen High School) nominated me to play in the Blue-Gold game, scheduled for August. Although at this point in time Perry had married and moved away, he would attend the game, and Bill Coursey would give me a nice pair of cleats to wear in the game.

While I knew that the game was played to support and benefit Delaware's children who had disabilities of the intellectual nature, I must admit that I really had no clue as to the impact that this game would have on the lives of everyone who was fortunate enough to become involved.

When I look at the effect that my neighbors (Perry Reese and the Coursey brothers - William and Henry) had upon me, I cannot say enough about the benefits of the caring and giving back which we as human beings have the ability to do for one another. Therefore, I encourage all of us to remember that "to whom much is given, much is required and expected of." Therefore, let us all continue to reach out and give back in the spirit of the game for this mighty cause!



BENEFICIARY SPOTLIGHT

DFRC gives KSI startup funding in 1962

Kent-Sussex Industries, Inc. (KSI) has had a relationship with DFRC since 1962 when DFRC showed enough confidence in a grass roots organization to provide a \$10,000 seed grant to the founding members of KSI. Originally founded as the Golden Opportunity Center, Inc. (GOCI), the mission was to serve the employment needs of individuals with disabilities. In a 500 square foot facility that first year, we served 15 individuals.

Through employment, KSI has been able to enrich a person's life in a variety of ways. In the 2009 fiscal year, KSI paid its employees in excess of \$1,690,000. In addition to wages earned, we saw individuals gain confidence and strive for new goals. We've met families who are very proud of their loved one's accomplishments, and thankful that KSI offers transportation and other supports that have allowed that individual to achieve a degree of independence.


Today, KSI operates from a 72,000 square foot facility in Milford and serves more than 275 individuals annually, with more than 100 of those individuals working in the community. KSI provides several different employment options designed to best meet the needs of the individuals we serve. We have a strong work force in our Milford facility, which completes sub-contracts for a variety of businesses. These jobs are constantly changing as deadlines are met and new contracts arrive.

Another employment option offered at KSI allows individuals to work at a business location in the community. These "community based work crews" are supported with KSI's staff and transportation, as are the individuals employed in KSI's facility programs. One of these work crews is responsible for the operation of KSI's Cartridge Service business, an entrepreneurial venture started in 1995.

The most independent employment option offered by KSI is our Supported Employment Program. Individuals in this program need minimal supports and work very independently. While KSI does not provide transportation to these individuals, we do provide continual, on-going support services. KSI staff maintains a relationship with the hired individual and the employer so that a successful working relationship can remain strong.

KSI's relationship with DFRC is strong and continues to grow, as we both enjoy providing quality services to the individuals with disabilities who participate in our programs. Over the years, DFRC has provided funding to KSI, enabling us to begin a music therapy program, open a computer lab, and provide training to our staff. In addition to providing employment opportunities, KSI has broadened its scope recently to include volunteer opportunities and more community involvement.

We find it heartwarming that KSI was founded with funds earned through one of the first DFRC Blue-Gold All- Star Football Games. It touches our heart because some of our employees have talked about their experiences as buddies in the Blue-Gold program. Some of our supporters and business associates also participated in the game as athletes. In 1974, DFRC started the Hand-in-Hand Program, which was developed to partner young buddies who have a disability with high school game participants, like athletes, band members and cheerleaders. DFRC is widely known in the community as the sponsor of this game and the opportunities it provides.

How could we have known that both organizations would touch the same families in different ways? DFRC continues to touch individuals and families in a variety of ways through its support of various organizations. KSI continues to meet the employment needs of individuals who have a disability. KSI's mission is to assist people with disabilities in the pursuit of their potential in employment and meaningful participation in their communities."
